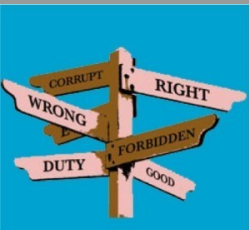

Course Structure

The course is divided into two main units. Both units cover various topics which are relevant & important in the world today. They include the religious perspectives of Christians & Jews as well as non-religious viewpoints such as atheists & humanists.

Unit 1 Religious & Philosophical Themes. Studied in Year 10, this unit looks at the main beliefs, teachings & practices of Christians & Jews on themes such as **'Life and Death'** including God & life of Jesus; Worship; Work of charities & organisations; Value of life (abortion & euthanasia); Soul (ghosts & the afterlife); Stewardship & scientific theories of existence

And **'Good and Evil'** including Morality & justice; Crime & punishment (death penalty); Forgiveness & pacifism; War; Good, evil & suffering; Holocaust; Persecution of Christians in modern era.

Unit 2 Religion and Ethical Themes

The course will look at the main beliefs, teachings & practices of

Christians & Jews on **'Relationships'** including Rites of passage; Holy text; Pilgrimage, symbolism & festivals; Prejudice & discrimination; Family & sexual relations; Marriage, adultery, homosexuality; Role of men & women (gender equality)

And **'Human Rights'** including Extremism; Censorship; Human rights; Equality; Work of organisation/individuals - charities; Wealth & poverty; Social justice.

Pupils will also look at *non-religious* viewpoints on all topics

Post 16 & Careers At 'A' Level, Religious Studies combines well with many subjects e.g. Psychology, Sociology & other Humanities. Many choose at first to study it at 'AS' Level and then develop onto 'A' Level.

Possible Careers Law/police/probation; Administration; Librarianship; Social work; Teaching; Counselling/psychotherapy; Marketing;

Nursing; Doctor; Journalism; Current affairs
